## Thank You - Parish Consultation Opening Session

Thank you to everyone who joined us for the opening session of *Your Parish, Your Voice* on Monday, 21st July at The Becket School. Your presence and thoughtful contributions helped launch this important consultation process with a strong sense of shared purpose and community spirit.

Approximately 140 parishioners from the four churches of the Parish of the Annunciation, along with parishioners from Our Lady of the Angels in East Leake, took part in the evening. The session was hosted by Fr. John, supported by members of the Parish Mission Group (PMG), and graciously facilitated by Pat Jones from Holy Spirit Church.

The session provided an opportunity for parishioners to better understand the background and purpose of the consultation, ask questions, express concerns, and share their hopes for the future of the parish.

A summary of feedback gathered during the small group discussions—responding to the questions "What are your hopes or concerns about this process?" and "What question do you need answered?"—is now available at the back of the church, on the church notice board, and via email to newsletter subscribers.

One key takeaway from the session was a strong desire to extend the questionnaire deadline to give parishioners more time and space to reflect before responding. After discussing this with Our Lady of the Angels, we're pleased to confirm that the deadline has been extended to Sunday, 10th August.

We remain deeply committed to listening to your voice and will be arranging a few more meetings either to provide updates, respond to questions, or continue gathering input from parishioners.

We are committed to keeping you informed throughout this process and will continue to share updates on the timeline and next steps. In the meantime, we warmly encourage you to stay engaged by connecting with your Local Church Group, the Parish Mission Group, the Parish Office, Fr. Evarist, or myself directly.

Thank you once again for walking this journey with us as we discern the way forward together.

## **Greeting from Lukas Mickevicius, Pastoral Placement during Summer**

Thank you very much for the warm welcome that I've received in your parish! Fr John has encouraged me to write to you here to share a few things about myself and my vocation to the priesthood.

I was born in Lithuania to a Catholic family (Lithuania is mostly Catholic), baptised when I was small, received First Holy Communion at the age of 9, but did not engage much with the Faith. I came to this country to finish school at boarding school in Wiltshire. I then came here to study biochemistry at the University of Nottingham - there in the Catholic Chaplaincy I began to understand the Faith much better and in the fourth year of my studies - as the country was emerging out of Covid - it began to dawn on me that I may be called to be a priest rather than a scientist. I joined some friends in the monthly diocesan discernment group that was run by Fr Neil Peoples and Fr Liam Carpenter, who many of you will remember. After 1.5 years of discernment, during which I graduated and

started working, I was put forward and accepted by Bishop Patrick to be a seminarian for our diocese. Since that day I've spent a year in the Royal English College in Valladolid, Spain and started a 6 year course in St Mary's College, Oscott in Birmingham. These are the basic facts, but if you'd like to find out more about me or about seminary, or about discernment/vocation, or about anything else that you think I might be competent at, catch me after weekly or Sunday Masses or any time you see me in the parish and I'd be happy to talk to you. I'll be staying in the parish until Monday 4th August.

**St Anne's Friday lunch time refreshments** Refreshments will be suspended for the month of August, but we look forward to welcoming you back on 5th September.



#### Parish Consultation Meeting - 21st July 2025: Questions and Concerns

A summary of c. 30 minutes in which the small groups fed back. The points in bold gained wider support from the participants by applause or cheers. Some points have been summarised to avoid repetition. We invited people to answer two questions: what are your hopes or concerns about this process; and what question do you need answered.

These are consolidated notes from the recordings and notes made by the PMG secretary.

#### **Questions raised**

#### A About the options mentioned in the questionnaire

- 1. Has the option been considered of having one or two churches with Mass and others remaining open but without Mass? Have a rotation of masses across the churches
- 2. Why can't we retain some of the churches as Mass Centres with a big screen so that people can gather and zoom in together to a streamed Mass, and retain their communities? We could use Eucharistic Ministers and still have our own music and celebrations? Is this not a way we can retain our churches in our communities not just for now but going forward too?
- 3. If we retain the buildings even without Mass, how will we find the money to pay their maintenance? (But Cotgrave is self-sustaining and this can be managed..). How will the different Churches be maintained and financed. Holy Spirit and Radcliffe need a lot of money spending on them. It is impractical to keep them all there are still costs to maintain them even if they are standing idle
- 4. Has any consideration been given to grouping churches differently from what we have at the moment? For example, could Our Lady and St Patrick's be linked, or Corpus Christi Clifton; what are the parameters for the grouping we've got?
- 5. Why was the solution of using Becket discarded?
- 6. Has there been consideration of using other Christian churches in the borough which may be redundant or have space? e.g. the Methodist Church in Bingham.
- 7. What options have been considered already and discounted? How can options have already been dismissed if the process is open and transparent? If there was a proposal to close two Churches, why was that not said in the Consultation?

#### Added as the meeting ended:

- **8.** What did the Bishop base his decision on when he decided that one church in a new location would work for the 4 parishes?
- **9.** What work has been done to establish why numbers at Mass are in decline and what has been done to increase numbers?

## B About how we do the process well

- 10. If/when one or more churches close it will be like a bereavement; can we make sure we have a process to really welcome those who then come to other churches?
- 11. Have we been into the schools to ask our young people their opinion, because they are our future?
- 12. There is a question in the questionnaire for parents to discuss with their children.
- 13. What's the timeline going forward, and how will decisions be made? Can we have more information on the timescales. Who will make the ultimate decision?
- 14. Can we see the accounts, to understand the financial situation? They have not been published. We need to know the information (Including detailed costings of each church) to make competent decisions and become more generous. Transparency should extend to advice about potential renovation cost. Projections of Mass attendance and demographic changes in the area.
- 15. What is a reasonable ask of our parish priests in terms of Mass commitments; maybe we need to work to this and then supplement this with deacons led services of the Word.
- 16. Can we have more information on the timescales
- 17. What attempts have been made to make efficiencies in the admin of the Parish?

#### Added as the meeting ended:

- 18. Would it be helpful to have an idea of what number and type of laity would be needed to successfully 'staff' three churches, such as deacons, eucharistic ministers etc, and then see about a recruitment drive to meet this?
- 19. Many people would find it helpful to have clear outlines of a variety of plans, and the possibility of voting on them, providing a clear outcome that could be carried forward. This would avoid the sense of unclarity and going round in circles.

- C About wider issues which are relevant but probably can't be solved in this process; we can keep these to report to the Bishop and/or discuss later.
- 20. What can we do about vocations and evangelisation, to see the numbers in church going in an upward direction?
- 21. Can we look at the criteria for ordination; why can we not consider women priests and married priests?

#### D Concerns raised

- About the relationship between schools and the parish if there is no church in West Bridgford; there will
  be an impact on Becket and the primary schools which are so tightly linked through many events and
  activities. What will be the impact on the children's growth in faith
- About the location of churches; what is best to achieve objectives like evangelisation, the sacraments and reaching out to the poor; What location or locations are best to achieve those objectives; bearing in mind that West Bridgford is 40% of borough; and about the need to consider transport links; many don't have cars and bus routes run between West Bridgford and the villages but not between the villages. People will go to town or to Clifton if they don't drive. And as we age, we won't all be able to drive, even if we drive now. Taking two buses to get to Mass is too much. People are more likely to bus to the Meadows and go to St Patricks or bus to town and go to the Cathedral. So you will be losing a lot of people who don't drive and currently go to West Bridgford.
- Think about those who are on the edges of our parish as well as those in the 'centre' of West Bridgford; what needs do they have?
- We need to look at the causes, not just the symptoms of too many buildings and too few priests; how do we increase attendance? it starts with children and younger people; how do we get out children into a church which is not within walking distance of the school premises? Where would the budget come to cover this cost. This is also essential if we're concerned about vocations; they also start with children and young people being active in the church to increase the likelihood of vocations.
- Where are our young people in this community? What are their parents doing to encourage participation in faith and the church?
- About the loss of community if the church is a great distance from where you live; people will go somewhere else. Community is 'a massive thing'.
- If you take the church out of the community, you lose the community. It seems perverse to close the Church with the biggest Mass attendance and the proximity to schools.
- About the size of the community; this parish is already getting to the point where the human scale is
  difficult; people need communities of a certain size if they are to be able to relate to one another; if we
  have only one or two churches, how are we going to have the kind of community that passes on faith?
- About the transparency of this process; If an offer was made on land at Tollerton, how can this process be described as not a foregone conclusion? It feels as though there is a 'foregone conclusion' because there is no 'do nothing' option presented; so it feels as though what we will end up with is different from what we have now; which still feels like 4 parishes, even though joined together. It's vital that the decision-making is transparent; otherwise this is just a waste of time and will fragment the parish further
- How does building a big Church help if taking away from the schools? There is a lack of facts. What is the evidence? The transparency of the process has to be obvious. Is it an executive decision, and is this all a waste of time?
- About the loss of the actual buildings; each church is important in its own locality; people drive past and can get pulled in; if the buildings are not there, their outreach will disappear.
- About the experience of people in Bingham; when the mass centre closed in COVID, many, even most, did not travel; whatever church you decide to close, you will have a big loss in that area. There was a big Catholic community and they would not travel, so whatever Church you decide to close you will have a big loss of people in that area. People will zoom or go to into the Cathedral. The community will fragment, which is a shame as it is a good community. There are lessons from the loss of Bingham and the beautiful Masses there; it had a higher attendance than Radcliffe; not many of those now go to Radcliffe; some go to the CofE or elsewhere. The many Hong Kong families in Bingham go to the Methodist Church and give generously there.
- About the dissonance between Bishop Patrick asking us to be missionary disciples and the reality that all around, churches are closing, and the church seems to be in decline.
- About the lack of detail in the statistics, which are out of date and seem to indicate decline in numbers;
   but they don't seem to include the numbers who come as new members; for RCIA etc; the new

members mostly go to HS. The school has welcomed a huge number of Hong Kong families and many have taken part in the RCIA, which has been 'humbling'; if we close Holy Spirit doors, we will be closing our door to the Holy Spirit.

- How would the personal commitments made at the Holy Spirit be preserved if Holy Spirit was closed?
- Where have the people gone that we have lost from our churches? Has there been any outreach?

## Added as the meeting ended

- Parking at Holy Spirit is an issue if we want planning permission, but it's a red herring if we don't need
  planning permission. 10 years ago we had 4 busy masses at the weekend and we all managed to park
  further away and walk.
- If one church is expanded there is a concern that all management/activity to run the church would fall to those who already manage things at that church. This is the case at Holy Spirit for parish wide events and leads to concern that others won't volunteer to help at a church that isn't theirs.
- What will happen to community services that the local churches provide e.g. Holy Spirit Social Centre and Cotgrave charity shop?

## E Hopes expressed

- We want to bring everyone with us, young and old. Whatever happens, we shouldn't fall out about the decisions. We have to help and support each other.
- What matters is what does God want for us, not what do we want.
- Reflecting on everyone having their own gifts, what more can we do to support the priests?
- Build a community upwards from the children; have specific things for children, with fun and something different built in?
- We have to train people to be missionaries in their own communities.
