My First Pilgrimage Experience by Clare Breffitt, Saint Margaret Clitherow, Keyworth

I first came across the opportunity to go on a pilgrimage to Rome when Fr. John Martin mentioned it during Mass one Sunday. I became interested because the trip was open to teenagers.

Eventually, the time came to begin our pilgrimage.

Our first stop in Italy was Assisi. This is where St. Francis, St. Clare, and the Blessed Carlo Acutis are from. While we were there, we saw St. Clare's body, which is covered in beeswax. This gave me mixed feelings, as she is the saint I'm named after. At first, I felt uneasy as she looked like a statue, but it was actually her preserved body. That strange feeling soon faded and was replaced by a wave of peace.

Then we visited the tomb of Carlo Acutis, which was in a small church that felt very homely. He looked like he was peacefully sleeping, maybe dreaming about the future of technology. I found this relatable, as in a way, I am part of that future he once imagined, especially when we play on our phones and iPads.

Next, we visited St. Francis's tomb, located in a large and beautifully detailed church full of gold and incredible paintings. We also had Mass in a small chapel there, led by Fr. John Martin and Fr. Neil Peoples, this was a truly beautiful experience.

After Assisi, we travelled to Rome. One of our first stops was Santa Maria Maggiore, where Pope Francis' final resting place is. There we had Mass lead by Fr John Martin and Fr Neil, right next to where Pope Francis is buried. Then on the other side is where Pope Francis used to pray to Santa Maria, after every overseas trip, and we got to go in where there was a Mass being said in Italian, and we received a blessing. Then we went to the Basilica of St. John Lateran, where we entered through one of the four Holy Doors in Rome. From there, we rushed to the Holy Stairs of Scala Sancta where we knelt and climbed all 28 steps. I got stuck behind a slow couple, which made the pain in my knees even worse. Once we reached the top, a peaceful mini chapel with monks singing awaited us, it was so calming and spiritual after the hard climb on my knees. Next, we visited the Basilica of San Pietro in Vincoli, where we saw the chains that held St. Peter in prison in Jerusalem and also saw the relics of the crib from Bethlehem. The organ music playing in

the background made the moment feel surreal.

The following day, we attended the Pope's funeral. It was an amazing, peaceful, and an emotional experience. We had the best view of St. Peter's Square, surrounded by over 200,000 mourners from all over the world, all united in honouring one man. We received the Eucharist during the service, which reminded me of the miracle of Jesus feeding the 5000. The respect shown by everyone who only clapped instead of cheering during the homily was deeply moving (source: VATICAN MEDIA Divisione Foto).





Later that day, myself, Mum, Aunty Ann, and our new friend Jacqui entered St. Peter's Basilica through another Holy Door, our third in Rome. I joked that I must have saved all the souls in purgatory by now! Inside, we saw the famous Pietà, the statue of the Virgin Mary weeping over Jesus, which was breathtaking. The basilica was filled with statues, gold ceilings, and beautiful paintings. It felt even more special on the day of the Pope's funeral. - Continued from previous page - The next day was the Youth Mass, filled with young people my age. It was so encouraging to see, since you don't often see many teenagers at Mass. Originally, the Youth Mass was meant to celebrate the canonisation of Carlo Acutis. It began with the Rosary, followed by Mass and even though we were at the very back of the Travertine Square, we still received the Eucharist. Receiving the Body of Christ twice in the Vatican felt like a double blessing, with waves of peace washing over me, and any stress I had disappeared.

After the Mass, Fr. John Martin treated us to a lovely meal near the Vatican. After lunch while the others went back to St. Peter's square, I, Mum, Aunty Ann, and Jacqui went to the Divine Mercy Church, where we prayed the Divine Mercy Chaplet at 3:00 pm on Divine Mercy Sunday. It was beautiful, though I struggled a bit because of the heat and the crowds.



Later, we visited the Trevi Fountain and tossed in a coin while making a wish. Then we went to the Spanish Steps, I ran all the way up and back down just so I could say I did it!

This is just a brief overview of what we did on the pilgrimage, and I have to say I will need a week off school to recover and to process everything we did during the trip....

Thank you, Fr. John Martin for telling us all about it, and I will 100% be going on the next one when Carlo Acutis is canonised, and would definitely recommend this to the youth of our parish.
